Free dog training workshops offered

og trainer Debbie Dobson of "Good Dog" Animal Behavior will provide FREE workshops, open to the public, but not to dogs. The sessions will be held at Henderson County library branches from 10:30am until about noon on Saturday, May 7 in Edneyville, and again on Saturday, May 21 in Etowah.

Dobson emphasizes that positive, healthy relationships (of all kinds) are based on mutual respect, trust and affection. The love you have for your dog is the basis of forming the bond between you, and that strong bond means your dog wants to please you because s/he loves you. She says you should become your dog's "benevolent leader". As a leader, be patient, take small steps if necessary, and do everything you can to help your dog understand what you are asking.

Always remember to sincerely praise your dog - they recognize our genuine happiness and want to bask in it as much as possible! Over time, you will see a loving devoted partnership develop between you and your pup.

Dobson points out that there are eight things to remember when training a dog:

- Dogs can be opportunists: this is the origin of "counter surfing"!
- We are asking them to understand a brand new language - ours!
- Most dogs want and prefer direction from a leader - you!
- The calmer you are, the calmer your dog will be.
- All dogs need regular, daily aerobic exercise.
- Most dogs are not aggressive; they are excited.
- Dogs need to be socialized and exposed to other dogs and all kinds of people.

• It's perfectly OK to set reasonable behavioral boundaries with your dog.

According to Dobson, the three most common unwanted canine behaviors, and their solutions, are:

- Jumping up on people when greeting them. She suggests owners teach "Sit" when greeting.
- · Barking. Dobson says to gently place your hand around your dog's muzzle and say, "Quiet" or "No barking." You may also need to use a spray bottle filled with water.
- Pulling while on leash. Dobson reports "tremendous success" with the Freedom No-Pull Harness, available at www.usadog. com. She also recommends reading a particularly helpful article about teaching your dog not to pull while walking. The article can be found at www.aspca.org/petcare/virtual-pet-behaviorist/dog-behavior/ teaching-your-dog-not-pull-leash.
- Another increasingly common behavior is what is called "leash reactivity". There are usually two reasons for it: either your dog is thrilled about meeting another dog and wants to immediately greet them, or they fear an approaching dog, perhaps because they've had an unpleasant prior experience or simply because this is a new dog - an unknown. She urges dog owners to read a helpful ASPCA article for further understanding and suggestions. Area therapy dog running for Hero Dog Award



Sam, the compassionate therapy dog.

Saluda therapy dog Sam is once again in the running for an American Humane (AHA) Hero Dog of the Year award. In 2015, he was nominated but did not make the semi-finals in the Therapy Dog category, one of eight in which the Society presents awards.

Sam is a 45 pound Lab mix about seven years old. Saluda resident Nancy Weinhagen found him as a puppy outside a veterinarian's office. She fell in love with him immediately, so she took him home and adopted him after failing to find his owner. He passed the therapy dog training

bringing joy and solace to people ever since. Sam is an equal-opportunity lover, and visits retirement homes, including those for veterans; hospitals, children's' reading programs at the Saluda library; and elementary schools, where Sam and Weinhagen teach children how to safely meet and greet dogs.

He sat with one aging veteran and comforted her as she passed on. Then, as she had requested, Sam attended her funeral in Black Mountain. These days, Sam is a regular visitor to Mrs. Helen Cagney at the Tryon Estates senior facility. She always looks forward to his visits, and encourages him to join her on her bed, which Sam happily does.

In addition to the Therapy category, the other AHA Hero Dog award categories are Arson, Emerging Hero, Service, Guide/ Hearing, Law Enforcement, Military and Search and Rescue Dogs. Semi-finalists in each category are chosen by on-line votes at www.herodogawards.org/vote. Supporters were able to vote once a day through April 27, which happened to be the first day of distribution for this issue of PetGazette. Sam's story was on the PetGazette web site and Facebook page, which hopefully helped him get enough votes this year to get into the semi-finals.

On-line voting for one of the three semi-finalists in each category begins Wednesday, May 11 and ends Sunday, June 22. In selecting a finalist from each

program about a year later, and has been category, voting will count 50%. The other 50% of the decision will come from a panel of expert judges. Voting for the one overall Hero Dog of the Year Award will start July 6 and end August 24, 2016. As with the semi-finalists, winners in each category will be determined 50% by votes, 50% by judges.

Pets for Vets: How Dogs Help Veterans

The numbers are staggering, frightening 1 and sobering. As of September 2014, there were 2.7 million American veterans just from the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) has been estimated in 11 to 20% of those vets. For 2013, that was roughly 12,632 soldiers. Since 2002, 118,829 warriors have been diagnosed with PTSD. Also, there are an estimated 15% of Vietnam vets diagnosed as having PTSD. A 2013 Veteran Affairs study showed an average of 22 veterans commit suicide every day.

Why? For many of these soldiers, they are still in Afghanistan, Iraq or Saigon; the lands where they fought for America.

Imagine the complexity of this (partial) list of PTSD symptoms these warriors face: Flashbacks. Nightmares. Frightening thoughts. Avoidance and staying away from places. Losing interest in previously enjoyable activities. Feeling guilty. Feeling numb. Depression. Hyperarousal. Feeling tense. Being scared easily. Having uncontrollable outbursts. Difficulty sleeping. Alcoholism and drug addictions. Their individual symptoms compiled can lead to an emotional paralysis.

Think of going to the movies. It's enjoyable for most people. With PTSD, it can become an anxious nightmare. It's dark, crowded, and people are whispering. There are frequently sudden outbursts of screaming or laughing. To someone already task trained. They offer comfort and

road to flashbacks--and just one example of how difficult normal, daily living can be. The price they paid for war can leave them emotionally--and physically--crippled.

Enter the dogs. There are two types of dogs that can be used to assist veterans. One is a service dog. These are trained with specific commands based on the needs of

the veteran. They might do things like "Block" their owner, offering the protection of a barrier and space. "Lights" tells the dog to go ahead and turn on lights so the owner doesn't have to enter a darkened room. "Sweep" orders the dog to enter a room or house first, sweeping it for people and barking to alert the veteran they are not

alone. "Bring" tells the dog to fetch an item and bring it back. For veterans with limited mobility or vision challenges, these skills are invaluable. For anyone with tension issues, these dogs can offer a true sense of security.

The second type is an emotional support dog, which are not necessarily specific-

tense and hyper-aroused, this is a hellish companionship. They provide a safe refuge from flashbacks, nightmares, panic attacks or other anxious moments. Health benefits for vets just having a dog range from decreasing their loneliness and anxiety to providing comfort and exercise. Dogs help vets with socialization challenges, reduce their stress and improve their self-esteem. Veterans often cite they feel shut down,

> afraid or unable to engage with family and friends anymore. The accepting nature of the dog breaks those barriers. The dogs can sense when their person is having a flashback, nightmare or panic attack and can bring them back. They do tasks difficult or impossible for vets to do and have even been credited for saving the lives of their owners on occasion.

The best part of all this? The dogs! Some are previously owned by the vets, and trained for their specific needs. Many more are shelter three-part series about pets enriching dogs who have been taken in by the numerous groups who provide dogs to vets and now have both a forever home and a wonderful new purpose in life. A dog's life is saved and now a soldier is helped and healed.

Groups all over the US provide trained dogs or training for vets. In North Carolina, there is Paws4Vets. Their "primary mission is to train and provide qualified individuals with certified assistance dogs custom trained to fit their individual requirements and needs.". (They also service VA, WV, OH, PA, MD, SC, GA and FL) www.Paws4Vets.org.

In Asheville, we have Warrior Service Dogs, a 501(c) 3 non-profit organization that "provides disabled Veterans with specially trained service dogs to assist them in their path to recovery and everyday life". They can be found at www. warriorservicedogs.org and on Facebook at www.facebook.com/warriorservicedogs.

Is "All Natural" pet food really all natural?

Tost pet parents are drawn in by pet Lood labels promising "All Natural" or "Organic" ingredients. But how are "All Natural" and "Organic" legally defined?

Many regulations relate to these terms, but the FDA says there is no legal definition of the term "All Natural." The FDA and AAFCO (Association of Animal Feed Control) requirements simply dictate that if the product doesn't include added colors, artificial flavors or synthetic substances it can be marketed as "All Natural." Surprising, isn't it?

It may also be surprising to know that pet foods processed with certain synthetic substances like petroleum products or hydrogenated sugars are often classified as "organic" as well as meeting the requirements for "all natural." The National Organic Program of the USDA helps create a guideline for products labeled "Organic," and is authorized to establish the National List of Allowed and Prohibited Substances. This National List contains both synthetic substances that are permitted and certain natural substances that are prohibited for socalled organic production.

Most of us assume "organic" means "occurring naturally". Most of us also assume that any product that can be labeled as organic must automatically be "All Natural". But neither assumption is currently correct. That is why class action law suits against certain products labeled "All Natural" and/or "Organic" were successful in adding two new components to the definition of "All Natural"

a. A natural ingredient is one that comes from or is made from a renewable resource found in nature.

b. Minimal processing involves only kitchen chemistry; processes that can be done in a family kitchen and do not negatively impact the purity of the natural ingredient.

These definitions have not vet been legally adopted by the FDA, and as yet have no legal impact on pet food labels. They are, however, important to an accurate evaluation of pet products labeled "All Natural" and/or "Organic".

When evaluating pet foods, it is also important to know whether they contain the vitamins, minerals, and enzymes necessary for the absorption of those nutrients. Foods in their original state, as grown or as raised, contain nutritional values that include vitamins, minerals and the enzymes needed for the absorption of those nutrients. But most pet foods today use added supplements that are chemically and structurally different from those commonly found in foods. The majority of vitamin supplements used are USP vitamins, also known or labeled "Natural" or "pharmaceutical grade".

The USP or U.S. Pharmacopeia Convention is a non-profit scientific organization, whose goal is to standardize and verify vitamins. It says: A supplement successfully meeting our rigorous testing and auditing criteria receives the USP Verified Mark. When you see the Mark, it means the supplement:

- a. Contains the ingredients listed on the label, in the declared strength and amounts,
- b. Does not contain harmful levels of specified contaminants,

c. Is made according to FDA and USP Good Manufacturing Practices, using sanitary and well-controlled processes.

The second bullet point - "Does not contain harmful levels of specified contaminants" raises a concern. This statement exists because "natural" or USP supplements are created by extracting and concentrating the vitamins from a food source in a laboratory. Unfortunately, this extraction requires a chemical process that in most cases utilizes petroleum derivatives or hydrogenated sugars. Those are the same potentially harmful "synthetic substances" that could be considered harmful contaminants.

My personal effort to create a pet food providing 100% of nutritional needs per feeding, without synthetic substances, ran into disturbing realities. "All Natural" doesn't always mean all natural. Products labeled as "organic" can include inorganic synthesized compounds. By the manufacturer's definition, "organic" includes no measures for quality. It only concerns itself with how an ingredient was grown or raised. In fact, organic ingredients sold for pet foods regularly include things that cannot be sold for human consumption, including dying, disabled, diseased and dead animals, plus fruits and vegetables showing signs of rot.

Look carefully as you choose your next bag or can of pet food. Is it really All Natural or Organic, as you understand those terms? Does it have a host of supplements? If the answers to those questions are "No", "No", and "Yes", is it really the food you want to buy? *

Senna the beautiful Standard Poodle pictured here, described to PetGazette recently what it is like to be a pet at a human's work.

"It can sometimes be very difficult for pets at a human's place of work, in my case Western Carolina Veterinary Surgery, to keep those humans on the job. My employee, David Crouch DVM., has a habit of stopping his paperwork to reach down to stroke my head. This also interrupts me when I'm trying to do my job, which is to sleep next to the desk."

"Every once in a while he actually asks me to do his job and sits me behind his desk. Being a dog, I can't read. But because I love David, I try to do my best. Because I am with Dr. Crouch only four years, I still have some work to do on this habit. But I am fortunate that Dr. Crouch is a veterinarian who loves his work, so he's a good employee because he's frequently at work in his custom-designed operating room with a dog or cat who needs help."

David designed this surgical suite

himself and it has all of the advanced equipment used in human surgical suites. He's in great demand as a surgeon, as his bon a fides attest: Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Surgeons, member of the American Veterinary Medical Association, charter member of the Canine Shoulder Society – and much more.

He's one of only 30 veterinarians in the country who can perform a very advanced elbow reconstruction on dogs. As if this weren't enough, he also works as a volunteer for the national organization Pilots n Paws, flying with his own plane to bring pets which are close to euthanasia to their forever homes. He helps the rescue organizations in the area by restoring rescued pets with ambulatory problems back to health.

Sometimes on the weekends he actually takes a break from all this work and flies us to somewhere warm in the winter, or we go camping in the summer. So I shouldn't complain. He's a pretty good employee after all."



Combatting "Hot Spots" in Pets

Summer is almost here, and lots of pets develop skin problems. "Hot spots" are a common superficial infection that can spread like a fire, so they earn the name. Anything that causes damage to the skin surface can lead to a breakdown of natural defenses.

Hot spots usually start by the pet chewing at the site, making the area red and angry. Staph bacteria think this is the perfect place to live, and, very quickly, there is a growing area of crusting, pain, and inflammation. This problem is most common in thick coated dogs, but any dog with allergies or sensitive skin can have recurring issues with hot spots.

Prevention is the best way to deal with these infections. Be sure you use good flea products, and brush your pet often to prevent mats. Brushing also lets you check the skin for early problems. If your pet has allergies, check with your veterinarian for effective treatments and stick with them.

If you find a moist, irritated spot on the skin, carefully clip all the hair around the edges to help keep it dry. You can gently clean the area with dilute betadine or Hibiclens type product, but don't use any cream based medications. The goal is to help it dry! If the spot seems to be spreading or not improving quickly, have your vet check before it turns into a "fire!"

ne of my favorite things about pet grooming is creative grooming grooming that differs from the standard breed groom. It is using imagination, feathers, rhinestones, and even animal safe dye to style your pet without compromising the comfort or safety of the pet. It is also a hot topic among animal lovers. I hope this article can clear up some of that

"Dare to get creative with your pet's grooming."

When I started getting into creative grooming, I wanted to make sure I knew everything I could. The last thing I wanted was to use any techniques or products that were unsafe for animals. I quickly learned that knowing about the skin and hair/fur and the science behind it all was key to it all. Animals are so different from humans. I also learned quickly that knowing how to read ingredients and what they mean was important. Just because other groomers are doing it, doesn't make it safe. Not everyone takes the time to educate themselves on the matter. Creative grooming can be

fun without harming the animal. As a pet why their new haircut or blue tail or little parent, I encourage you to ask questions. Make sure your groomer is educated and stays on top of the changing field.

After knowing your pet is in good hands with an educated groomer, dare to get creative with your pet's carved into the fur can give your pet a unique look. They naturally want to please us. They may not fully comprehend

Miniature American Shepherds? American Hairless Terriers? And the Pumi, not Puli, a small to medium sized Hungarian terrier?

Paw it Forward is presented by Dog Tag Art, and is ASH's first peer-to-peer fundraising campaign. The "Pets Helping Pets" campaign gives supporters and their pets the opportunity to help other local animals in need.

Peer-to-peer fundraising is a way to empower supporters to fundraise on behalf of an organization by engaging with their friends and family to reach a larger audience. Campaigners build their own Paw it Forward donation page through the user-friendly online fundraising platform, everydayhero. The pet's picture will be uploaded as the supporter photo and their playful and charming "voice" will do the asking.

For example, the "voice" accompanying has started a new fundraising effort the pet photo might say, "I'm Barkley and my family wouldn't know what to do without me! Who would finish off their leftovers and keep the bed warm while they're away? I'm so glad they chose me to be their companion! Will you please donate to help homeless pets find a loving family to call their own?"

> Campaigners will be eligible for prizes throughout the campaign and grand prizes will be awarded to the top fundraisers at the Paw it Forward Campaign Celebration June 26 at the AHS headquarters on Forever Friends Lane in Asheville. There will be tours of the AHS facilities and the Buncombe County Animal Shelter next door, refreshments, music, and presentation of the "Top Pawlanthropists"

> Promotional materials for the Paw It Forward campaign list several donation levels and what they would provide for homeless pets. For example, \$10 would provide pain medication for two suffering pets. \$25 would cover vaccinations to protect five animals from life-threatening diseases. \$250 would cover the cost of essential dental cleaning for one senior pet. And \$500 would provide veterinary assistance to three at-risk pets, keeping them in their homes and out of the shelter.

'Tis the Season to Avoid Hot Dogs

Summer is just around the corner. However, WNC temperatures have already climbed into the 80's in early spring. In warmer months, we are able switch to lighter clothes so we won't swelter wearing woolen sweaters and slacks.

Although some of us may find it inconvenient to switch our wardrobes from winter to summer clothes, at least we have that option. Unfortunately, other than possibly shedding an undercoat, dogs are always clothed in a fur coat. So what can we do to need to be in the car during warm weather,

help our dogs stay safe and healthy in warm temperatures?

To keep your dog cool in the summer heat, should you shave your dog's fur? In general, the answer is "No". There are some breeds, like poodles, whose fur

needs to be cut regularly because their fur feeling too uncomfortable to stay in the car. If is more similar to human hair and grows continuously. Also, there are some select cases that may call for shaving your dog. However, in most cases, shaving your dog's fur makes them less able to thermoregulate, or control their body temperature. Your dog's fur is naturally designed to keep them warm in the winter and cool in the summer. In addition, shaving your dog exposes their skin to the sun, which may ultimately lead to sunburn.

Never leave an animal unattended in a vehicle in warm weather. What is warm weather? Anything over 60 °F is too warm for an animal to be left in a car unattended especially if it is sunny conditions. In general, the temperature inside a car will rise by 20 degrees during the first 10 minutes and 30 degrees during the first 20 minutes.

That means, if the outside temperature is 70 °F, the temperature inside of a car will rise to 90 °F within 10 minutes, and 100 °F within 20 minutes. If you are in a situation that the dogs

> have another (adult) human stay in the car with the dogs. Make certain that the car is parked in the shade and the windows are wide open. Equip the person with a cellphone so that he or she can contact you when they are

possible, have the person then sit outside the car with the dogs until you return.



Three clubs, four events, hundreds of dogs at Ag Center Memorial Day Weekend

For the third consecutive year, three area dog clubs are coming together to host the Blue Ridge Classic of the Carolinas, a long weekend of competitions Conformation, Obedience, Rally and Agility.



Champions and would-be champions from all over America will compete at the Western Carolina Agricultural Center in Fletcher. The events are organized and run by The Blue Ridge Agility Club (BRAC), the Hendersonville Kennel Club (HKC), and the Spartanburg Kennel Club (SKC). All events are sanctioned by the American Kennel Club (AKC), and points won in Fletcher will count toward AKC titles

Friday, May 27 with a Conformation competition hosted by the HKC. That two day event will be held in rings 1 - 8 in the Davis Center. After Best of Breed and Best of Group winners have been chosen. one of the Group winners will be judged Best in Show sometime on Saturday afternoon, May 28.

On Sunday, May 29 and Monday, May 30, Memorial Day, a second Conformation competition will be hosted by the Hendersonville Kennel Club. As in all Conformation events, purebred dogs will be judged based upon how close they come to the recognized breed standard. Best of Breed winners will be chosen on Sunday and early Monday. Best of Group will be judged on Monday, and the seven group winners will compete Monday afternoon for the Best in Show title. Obedience and Rally competitions will be held starting on Friday in the Expo building, rings 11-14 and continuing through Sunday. Rally is basically a "Beginner's Obedience", in which dogs and handlers go through a course at their own pace without the pressure of being timed.

Agility competitions will run for all four days of the Blue Ridge Classic of the Carolinas in the McGough Arena. Dogs of all kinds, sizes and backgrounds - mixed breeds are welcome - will jump hurdles,

The four days of events will start on go through tunnels, navigate a teeter-totter and weave through poles as their handler directs. Fastest time with fewest faults in each height category wins. The events will start each day about 8am and run until about 5pm.

> In addition to seeing all the competitions, visitors can meet with breeders and browse through dozens of vendor stalls. Vendors will be offering everything from basic leashes and basic training to high-fashion dog ensembles and custom memorials. All of this is available absolutely free, but there is a \$5 fee for parking. And non-competing dogs should be left at home.

Foothills Equestrian Nature Center offers Therapeutic Riding

The Foothills Equestrian Nature Center. carry out the teacher's instructions. Depending better known as FENCE, has as part of its mission "...educational and recreational opportunities linking nature, animals, and people." One program offered by FENCE, acronym TROT, uniquely links animals and people of all ages: Therapeutic Riding of Tryon. Therapeutic riding was developed in Europe during the early 1950's as a tool for improving the lives of individuals with physical disabilities

In 1952, champion rider Lis Hartel competed in the Helsinki Olympics. U Tube films clearly show her difficulty standing and walking from her bout with polio. Yet, she won the Silver Medal in Grand Prix Dressage, despite her challenges. Equine and medical professionals realized that with a therapeutic program, riding was beneficial to the physically challenged. This concept was brought to the U.S. through Canada by PATH, the <u>Professional Association</u> of Therapeutic Horsemanship International.

The concept has now been expanded to a wide range of challenges including emotional, interaction with horses, whether mounted or unmounted. Quoting from the FENCE website: "TROT classes are planned and taught by PATH Intl certified instructors and are built around the individual requirements of each student. In TROT's mounted program, typically, three volunteers - one to lead the horse, and two to serve as side walkers - assist each student to

on the needs of each student, mounted classes include exercises and games designed to promote balance, strength and coordination, and develop cognitive skills such as focusing, sequencing, and understanding and following

"In addition to therapeutic riding, TROT also offers an unmounted therapeutic program to individuals who, because of their disability. cannot sit astride a horse. Unmounted equine assisted therapeutic activities afford students the opportunity to experience the benefits of interaction with horses. Physical activities include grooming and leading the horses; cognitive and emotional activities include touching and caring for the horses, learning how horses communicate and relating the horse's behavior to human behavior; and developmental activities include learning to follow directions for a variety of activities, sequencing, and learning about horses and basic horsemanship."





5 TIPS TO HELP KITTENS THIS SPRING

homes for. Alley Cat Allies, dedicated to the humane treatment of cats, offers five easy ways people can help cats and kittens this spring. Visit www.alleycat. org/Kittens for a comprehensive guide to caring for kittens. Following is a condensed version of their suggestions.

Tip #1: Leave kittens with mom.

Like all babies, kittens are best left with their mothers, who instinctively know how to help their offspring. Neonatal kittens, four weeks old or younger, need around the clock attention and depend on mom for 100% of their care. Kittens five to eight weeks old can begin to eat wet food but are still being weaned. (To determine the age of a kitten, use Alley Cat Allies' Kitten Progression Guide at www.alleycat.org/ <u>KittenProgression</u>.)

If you find a kitten and know the mother is present, it is best to leave the kitten with her. To determine whether the Tip #3: Volunteer as a kitten foster mother is caring for the kitten, wait and observe for two to four hours to see if the mother returns. If she doesn't return, the kitten could be abandoned. If you are unsure, Alley Cat Allies has a number of resources available to help. The Alley Cat Allies' National Cat Help Desk can provide advice and direction. Another option is the Alley Cat Allies' Feral Friends Network – local individuals and

Tip #2: Don't bring neonatal kittens to an animal shelter.

Most shelters are not equipped or trained to provide the necessary roundthe-clock care for neonatal kittens. Some shelters have lifesaving programs for cats, but nationally, more than 70% of cats that enter shelters are killed. That number rises to virtually 100 percent for feral cats.

parent for a local rescue group.

There are kitten foster parent programs across the country. Though it is an investment of time and requires training, volunteering to foster young kittens is lifesaving and rewarding. To learn the basics of kitten care, register for Alley Cat Allies' free "Help! I found a kitten!" webinar at www.alleycat.org/ KittenWebinar.

It is springtime - "kitten season" - when organizations that may be able to help cats produce more babies then there are with hands-on advice.

Tip #4: Support and practice Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR).

TNR is the only effective and humane way of stabilizing and reducing community cat populations. In a TNR program, community cats are humanely trapped, brought to a veterinarian to be spayed or neutered, vaccinated, and ear tipped (the universal symbol that a cat has been neutered and vaccinated) before being returned to their outdoor homes. (Note: In the Asheville area, Friends2Ferals operates a TNR program.)

Tip #5: Advocate for policies and programs that protect cats.

Contact your shelter and local officials and tell them you support lifesaving policies for cats, including spay and neuter funding and spay and neuter before adoption. Write letters and call in support of community outreach and education programs that spread awareness about spay and neuter, community cats and TNR you can make a big difference.

"Advance Directives" protect your pet

We have all heard how important it is to make arrangements for the care of our children, the handling of our property, finances, and medical decisions in case we become disabled or die and can't manage those things ourselves.

The documents used to accomplish this are called "Advance Directives" and include a Will, Durable Financial Power of Attorney, Health Care Power of Attorney and Living Will. They allow us to make the decisions now, and, with the help of a lawyer, put our decisions in writing in a legally valid way. That insures our wishes can be honored even if we're no longer able to express them. But what about making arrangements for our pets?

Making sure a pet it is cared for in case we can't is a responsibility too often overlooked. Sadly, many dogs and cats end up in animal shelters or have been abandoned due to their owner's death and failure to provide for the pet's continued care.

You can avoid that tragedy by adding provisions to your Last Will and Testament regarding your wishes for your pet. But you cannot leave money to your pet, because animals are defined as property under the law. A Pet Trust is an excellent way to provide for your domestic animals even after you pass away.

A Pet Trust creates two roles: Caretaker and Trustee. The Caretaker assumes dayto-day care of your pet. The Trustee holds the money that you have set aside, and disburses it to the Caretaker to pay for your pet's expenses, such as food, grooming, and continuing veterinary care. You designate the people you want to fill these roles when you set up the Trust.

You can also name backups in case your first choices are unavailable for any reason. It is recommended that you choose a Caretaker who knows your pet, and who you trust to care for it as you would. The Trustee you choose should be someone who handles money responsibly, and who will communicate frequently with the Caretaker. The Caretaker and Trustee can be the same person, but a system of checks and balances is created if they are different people.

There is no set limit on the amount of money you can designate for your pet's care. But it is recommended that the amount be reasonable so as not to be challenged by family members or invalidated by the court. It is important to include information about your pet's habits, and personality, as well as the name of your pet's veterinarian and medical history. That will help make your pet's transition to a new home as smooth as possible.


