Horse Camps for Kids

Seven one week sessions of Basic Horse Camp, from mid-June through mid-August, will be offered at Brown Bear Farm nestled within the apple orchards in Flat Rock, North Carolina. There will also be a week of Young Riders Camp from July 6 –10.

Spending time around horses can help children to learn important life lessons, such responsibility, teamwork, friendship and physical fitness, in an environment that is natural and fun. The Basic Horse Camp option is open to children ages 5 to 14. Riders of all skill levels are welcome at the Basic Camps, even if the camper has never ridden a horse before. The Young Riders Camp option

is open to children 12 to 17, who are already proficient at the walk and trot, and may be starting to canter or jump. These riders may choose a dressage or jumping focus for the week, which even includes a field trip to a farm in South Carolina for a picnic and schooling in

Cross-Country. All weeks of camp will run Monday through Friday, from 9:00am until 3:00pm. Additional hours can be reserved ahead of time if parents need early drop off or late pickup around their work schedule.

Basic Course campers learn how to groom and saddle the horses, and will ride for two make soap, learn about leather working, bake pony cakes, decorate t-shirts and much more.

Campers also have Horse Education Time each day and learn about tack, nutrition, First Aid, foaling, holistic therapies, jumping and dressage. They even get to paint the parts of the body on a real live horse. There is also

> time allotted during the week for outdoor games, nature walks and scavenger hunts. The farm even has a range of fun indoor activities planned in case of inclement weather.

> The cost for horse camp is \$500 per camper for each session. A discounted rate of \$350 per child will be given for campers who attend multiple weeks or for more than one camper from the same family or organization. Payment plans may be arranged ahead of time

if needed.

Furry or Hairy, Grooming is Needed

s a groomer, the first thing I notice is Aa dog's coat. This allows me to know where to start grooming. Dogs can have a fur. This texture traps shedding hair and coat of fur or hair. Some may have both dander inside the coat, causing matting. or even be hairless.

Fur and hair are both made of keratin and both grow from a follicle. Humans have one hair per follicle whereas dogs can have many and this is why they at-home brushings and professional shed. A dog's coat can be silky, smooth, grooming to prevent matting. Matts are wavy, curly, thick, and/or wiry.

texture with a finer undercoat. Fur has a shorter growth cycle. The top coat, called a guard coat, protects the dog from bugs and other elements that can damage the skin. It is important to keep the undercoat removed regularly so the guard coat can keep the dog's skin breathing and the body be groomed just like hair bearing dogs. temperature regulated.

Shaving your dog can be harmful as it can damage the guard coat causing long term problems with the fur growth. This damage is called alopecia. Shaving a dog in warm weather can actually cause overheating. Dogs only sweat in pads of their feet and nose so they need the guard coat to keep cool. Removing the undercoat, dog's best friend." Does It Talk?

hy does this seemingly simple and innocent question raise so many hackles and cause bird owners to politely smile, and answer through clenched teeth.

For thousands of years, parrots have been kept as companions for their color, striking beauty, and talking ability. Egyptian hieroglyphics clearly depict natives with their pet birds, mostly what appear to be African Grey parrots, which are world renowned for their talking and cognitive ability. They have been scientifically studied for over 20 years and found to have the cognitive ability comparable to that of a five year old child.

unassuming individual When an innocently inquires "Does it talk?" that person is placing all of the importance of bird ownership on the parrot's speech capabilities. Parrots, like dogs and cats, are unique individuals, and each bird should be enjoyed for how it is. Talking ability should be the icing on the cake, not a deciding factor or requirement. Purchasing a bird of any species, at any age, even one that is well known for its talking ability does not assure that the bird will pick up speech any time during its life.

Parrots are wonderfully smart, intelligent creatures that can learn tricks, obey commands, and much more. When people zero in on one particular aspect of bird ownership, they often, unfortunately, give up the bird. The re-home rate for parrots is high. Unfortunately, even well-intentioned

individuals delve into bird ownership before quickly realizing that owning a bird can be much more difficult and time consuming than a dog or cat. It is, sadly, not uncommon for birds to be purchased for their talking ability, and then rehomed later when they do not learn to talk, and develop adverse behaviors like screaming

When approaching someone to ask about their bird, a few questions that bird owners love to answer include - "What kind of bird (or species of bird) is it? How old is your bird? What is your bird's favorite treats? Does your bird do any tricks?" Leading your conversation with questions other than 'Does it talk', shows sincere interest in the bird as an individual, which the parrot owner will truly appreciate. While no question is silly or too trivial, we do appreciate the people who take the time to form questions that will allow us to give educational responses. Parrot owners view interaction with non-bird-owners as opportunities for education, as we realize that not everyone has the opportunity to interact with pet birds.

So next time you approach a parrot and its owner, think twice about leading with "Does it talk?" Often, an outgoing bird will answer the question before its owner can.

Dock Diving Dogs to make splash in Asheville

Dogs of all shapes and sizes will be making a spectacular splash in downtown Asheville as part of Ingles Independence Day Celebration on Saturday, July 4th. Ultimate Air Dogs, the premier dock jumping organization in the United States, will host the events as dogs from all over the country practice, perform and compete in dock diving activities throughout the day.

The dock diving will be held in the center of downtown in Pack Square, next to the Vance Memorial. The 17' x 45' giant pool, with distance calibrations on the sides, will be set up and filled with 20,000 gallons of water. Dogs run down a dock and fly through the air to capture a thrown article like a toy, tennis ball or training bumper. Ultimate Air Dogs owner, Milt Wilcox, said the only items banned from on the dock are other organisms or their previous parts. For example, "You can't throw a steak," he said.

For the distance competitions, dogs are assigned into classes based on their jumping ability, not their size, breed or age. Both mixed-breed and purebred dogs are welcome to join in any or all of the competitions, including the non-distance competitions "Catch It", "Fetch It" and "Chase It". Wilcox said previous events in Asheville have attracted competitors from as far away as Michigan and Texas.

The Asheville July 4th schedule will include several qualifying rounds starting at 2pm, 4pm and 6pm, leading to the evening's finals competition at 7:30pm. So individuals and families will have plenty of opportunities to watch amazing diving dogs and their human companions work, play and

have a rollicking good time. As you imagine dogs flying through the air with huge smiles on their faces and tails wagging in the breeze, you may ask yourself, "What about my dog? Would my dog jump off the dock? Can we try?"

The answer is YES! Do you think your dog would like to jump off a dock for a toy, stick or lure? Are you willing to get up on the dock with your dog? Any dog bringing an adult human is welcome to register for the dock diving event. What's more, Ultimate Air Dogs encourages new comers. For this reason, they offer ample open dock time between competitions for practice runs. The organizers are always on hand to provide helpful instruction and training.

The champion distance jump in 2014 was 23 feet, accomplished by a Chesapeake Bay retriever from neighboring Brevard, NC. Whether you think your faithful companion can better that mark or not, you can have a great July 4th by experiencing Ultimate Air Dog at the Ingles Independence Day Celebration.

I had been dog-less nine months when whit came time to adopt again. But first, I needed a close inspection of my qu

first, I needed a close inspection of my expectations of a dog and my ability to meet its needs. My space is limited, so I considered similar, but smaller versions of my preferred breed. I contacted rescues and toured shelters, searching for an emotional connection. Months passed.

I applied to three breed specific rescues, outlining my experience, my time limitations and dreams of having a dog again. Honesty is paramount in this step. The application process is very similar in any quality breed rescue. Usually it begins with an internet search or word of mouth. Pictures intrigue and an application is started. Only one group required an application fee.

While the questions seem nosy prying, they really are from people who want only to see their animals placed into permanent homes with families that will treasure them. The process was not unlike applying to purchase a house. I had to provide character references and a vet reference. There were also house inspections with more questions. Why this breed? Where will it be kept when I am out? What would happen to it if something terrible happened to me? Would other family members be supportive? How are other household pets expected to interact? The list is endless, and tailored to each individual applicant,

all to make interested parties think about what they are committing to.

One group called to ask even more questions. What would the deal breaker

be? Had I considered this and that? No, they were not implying I was stupid or careless, just foresighted and careful. Another group requested I reinforce part of my fence.

Finally the time came to meet some dogs. I drove four hours to meet one. I wanted him. The choice was mine. I left to think it over and ultimately passed on him because he had special needs I didn't feel I could provide. I already had a special needs cat and felt it unfair to add

a special needs dog. He would find a great home, but not with me. A second group did not have anything matching my goals so I waited, touring the shelters again, watching Petfinder, and waiting.

When word finally came of some possibilities, I drove to meet them. A lovely blue merle collie caught my eye. He came from a hoarding situation, was insecure, unsocialized, had no training, was terribly underweight, matted and neglected. Yet looking into his eyes, I saw the look of intelligence, a heart of loyalty and a soul of desire. I could bond with this dog; we could eventually become best friends. Without even trying him on a leash, four months after my search began, I adopted Ty.

Life with Ty has been challenging and rewarding, progress coming in slow, steady baby steps, sometimes backward. But trust is forming, we'll get there. One thing I would highly recommend is joining a forum while waiting for the perfect partner to appear. My rescue group has a private Facebook page where Ty has his own fan club. People follow my updates, looking for pictures. Volunteers use the positive progress for fuel to help the next one, readers weigh in with suggestions for our obstacles and those waiting to adopt their own furbaby say they are learning what they can expect.

Dogs competing at Ag Center Memorial Day Weekend

Following their great success in 2014, three area clubs will join forces at the WNC Ag Center to put on four days of all-breed canine competitions including Conformation, Obedience, Rally and Agility from Friday, May 22 through Monday, May 2, 2015.

The events collectively are called the Blue Ridge Classic Cluster. The participating clubs are the Hendersonville Kennel Club (HKC), the Spartanburg Kennel Club (SKC), and the Blue Ridge Agility Club (BRAC). Spectators are welcome at all events. All the venues within the Ag Center complex are indoors and fully airconditioned, so visitors won't have to worry about early summer heat. Dozens of vendors providing everything from super-nutritious dog food to one-of-a-kind collars to canine DNA testing will ring the competition rings. Food and beverages will also be available.

Conformation, Obedience and Rally competitions will be run by HKC on Friday and Saturday, and by the SKC on Sunday and Monday. The activities will be divided between the Davis Event Center and the nearby Expo Building. The BRAC Agility Trials will run from Friday through Monday at the 65,000 square foot McGough Arena. A pedestrian gate connects the McGough Arena and the Davis/Expo venues so spectators can easily stroll from one place to the other.

The conformation competitions, held in Greenville until 2014, will feature dozens of



purebred dogs being judged on how closely they come to matching the ideal for their particular breed. Judging each day will start at 8am and go until the last dog is judged. Since the event is sanctioned by the American Kennel Club (AKC), "best of" winners for breed, group and show will earn points toward their championships. If the show attracts as many canines as it did in 2014, or more, there will be hundreds of prized pooches on hand. Show goers will have a chance to meet breeders and discuss with them whether their pups would be right for the visitor's family and lifestyle.

Rally is a new sport that provides a link between the Canine Good Citizen Program of the American Kennel Club (AKC) and the more rigorous competitions of Obedience and Agility. Dog and handler must complete a course designed by the rally judge at their own pace. The course has 10-20 stations, depending on the level of competition. In Agility competitions, dogs must run an obstacle course off-lead, following just the voice or visual



commands of the handler, who runs the courses with them. Agility dogs compete in classes based on height, and the obstacles, including jumps of different kinds, ramps, weave poles and teeter-totters are set at appropriate heights for each class. In Rally, the dog is on a lead while competing.

Visitors to the events are asked to not bring their own dogs. People wishing to go to the Davis Event Center or the Expo Building should enter through Gate 5. Those going to McGough Arena should enter through Gate 1. Admission to the events is free, but there is a \$5 general parking fee. 

7 Tips for Great Dog Photos this Summer

Tow that warm weather has finally arrived it's time to swing into full gear with outdoor activities with your dog and with your camera. What a great opportunity to snap those animated shots in favored locations that evoke your dog's personality! Some situations for great action photos of dogs are: frolicking a t the dog park, running an agility course, playing in the surf or digging a hole in the sand at the beach, jumping to catch a Frisbee or ball, interacting with children, standing in a boat, peeking over a log, or splashing through one of North Carolina's many streams during a hike.

Here are seven easy tips that can turn your average photos into great ones when photographing dogs.

1. Use Natural Light

Avoid flash, as the flash burst can result in red eyed photos or frighten the dog.

2. Focus on the Eyes

We all know that "Eyes are the window to the Soul" and this works for dogs as well

3. Show Off Their Character

What is the character of your pet? Is it hyper, lazy, or snoopy? Can you dddconvey that in a photo?

4. Change Your Camera Perspective

Try different angles. Get down on their level. You may have to lie in the sand Because the dogs move around so quickly

on your stomach to get that special shot. Watch your composition. Boring photos are usually centered so set up the subject to be off-center. Get in close physically or

by zooming your camera in to catch a paw, perked ear, or a water-covered snout.

5. Use a Higher Shutter Speed

a faster shutter speed will help catch their best action. This works especially well outdoors in good lighting. However, balance the shutter speed with the available light. Indoors may require a slower shutter speed. Setting your camera on burst or continuous mode, if it's available, can freeze the action during active play and give you a wonderful sequence of shots.

6. Use Special Treats to Get Their Attention

A little meat treats goes a long way to divert your dog's snout from whatever they are smelling at the side of the road. Making funny noises will usually get them to tilt their head or look up at you.

7. Add People

Add context to a shot by including your pet's special people. Sleeping with a child or settling into a family member's lap will yield photos that stand the test of time.

What is my biggest tip? Take a fantastic setting that will photograph well and add your furry friend in the foreground! This technique will add dimension and personalize your picture. Most of all, do a little preplanning. Remember to pack treats and take your camera and necessary accessories along with you.

Tips on Pet Arthritis

Degenerative joint disease (aka "arthritis") is a very common affliction in dogs and cats, and can be found in pets young and old.

Some ways to help prevent and manage arthritis include diet, nutritional supplements and controlled exercise. Make sure your pet does not become overweight or obese. If your pet is very overweight, ask your vet about what weight loss diet would


Large and giant breed puppies are at greatest risk for joint problems. A balanced diet during the puppyhood months is very important. Likewise, senior pets will require a different balance of protein, carbohydrates, vitamins and minerals. As your pet ages, seek your veterinarian's advice before changing its diet.

Joint nutritional supplements like glucosamine, chondroitin and omega fatty acids (fish oils) have been linked to cartilage and joint health. Consult your veterinarian about which joint supplement may be right for your furry friend.

Exercise is extremely important in maintaining muscle strength and joint mobility and flexibility. Explosive activities or rough play should be avoided if your pet has arthritis. Many pets may require prescription medications to ease painful arthritic joints. Always consult your vet before administering any medication. Many human over-the-counter medications may be harmful or deadly to pets.

Following these simple tips will help your friend live a more comfortable and happy life!


